SUPPORTING BILINGUAL LEARNERS

This course is part of the Master of Education programme. It is designed to provide outstanding opportunities for teachers to develop their professional knowledge and practice to support bilingual learners in the mainstream classroom.

The course is open to qualified teachers as well as allied professional workers such as speech and language therapists and educational psychologists.

It is in line with the most current developments in research, practice, policy and legislation, promoting innovative approaches to curriculum design and delivery for bilingual learners.

You will enhance your knowledge and practice of innovative approaches to curriculum design and delivery for bilingual learners.

Course Structure

The course is offered on a part-time basis over one year. It is not currently available by distance learning. Course delivery involves both face-to-face and online learning. Sessions include lectures, workshop activities and seminar presentations.



Curriculum

Module 1

Theories and Policies of Bilingualism and Second Language Acquisition (January - March)

The first module equips teachers with the theoretical understanding of bilingualism within the context of the Curriculum for Excellence and the Additional Support for Learning legislation (2004) which emphasises the need to match educational provision to the needs of each individual learner, including bilingual learners. Completion of this module enables an understanding of relevant theory to underpin student work on the subsequent modules.

Module 2

Policy and Practice in Supporting Bilingual Learners 3-18 (April - June)

The second module equips teachers with strategies for support of bilingual learners and aims to ensure that practice is informed by recent, relevant theory and research.

Module 3

Action Research to Effect Change for Bilingual Learners (August - December)

Having undertaken modules on theory, practice and policy in relation to bilingual learners, the final module equips teachers with the ability to plan and undertake a small piece of action research to effect change for the bilingual pupils for whom they have responsibility.

Assessment

Students are normally expected to have passed the assignment for each module prior to undertaking the next. The modules are assessed in a range of ways:

Module 1 – 3,000-word written assignment and peer-assessed presentation

Module 2 – materials production and two 1,500-word written assignments

Module 3 – research diary and written research report
