SCILT/CISS interns

The SCILT/CISS internship project was launched in March and we recruited six S5 (now S6) pupils from across the country. The aim of the project is to engage with 16-25 year olds through social media to raise the profile of language learning and to tie in with YOYP.

The interns are from Glasgow, East Renfrewshire, North Lanarkshire, Aberdeenshire and Queen Victoria School in Dunblane. Between them, they are learning or can speak French, Spanish, Italian, Gaelic, Mandarin and Korean! Primary workshops

Mini Business Brunches

SCILT welcomed 76 S3-S6 pupils from South Ayrshire on 25th September and 88 S3-S6 pupils from East Ayrshire on 9th October to take part in a mini Business Brunch event hosted by SCILT in partnership with DYW Ayrshire at Prestwick Airport. Approximately 10 employers were present at each event who demonstrated the relevance of language skills in a work context, encouraging pupils to continue their language studies into the senior phase of their secondary education, and beyond school. The final event will take place on 6th November, aimed at North Ayrshire schools.

Amazing Spaces Cross Curricular Project (Los Espacios Increíbles)

This is a cross curricular project, between languages and design and technology departments, which will take place primarily in schools. There are five schools participating in this project across three of the challenge authorities, Glasgow City, West Dunbartonshire and North Ayrshire Council.

SCILT will work in partnership with the Faculty of Architecture at the University of Strathclyde, and two lead teachers from each participating school to represent their respective subject areas.

The intention is to build a sustainable project and create a model which can be replicated by other schools and departments within universities throughout Scotland. The rationale for the project is linked closely to the priorities within the National Improvement Framework with a particular focus on improvement in employability skills and closing the attainment gap through wider achievement. Through their participation in this project we hope that learners will be able to make the potential links between the language they are learning and the world of work. By highlighting the opportunities that exist to build on language skills in further education pathways, which are not exclusively language based, we also hope to motivate our learners to continue with their language into the senior phase.

Eòghan Stewart is SCILT's Gaelic Professional Development Officer working on 0.2 PT basis paid for by Bòrd na Gàidhlig's Gaelic Language Act Implementation Fund (GLAIF).

He ran a successful conference on eLearning for Gaelic Learner Education in September. This is looking at developing the promotion, availability and sustainability of eLearning for Gaelic and other languages across Scotland. Eòghan is currently looking at next steps with stakehohlders.
