






Key stats

- To-date: 149 teachers signed up (and counting)
 - 80 on January cohort,
 - 69 on September cohort
- January cohort:
 - 32 English teachers
 - 26 primary teachers
 - 9 Social Studies teachers
 - 7 French/Spanish/German teachers
 - 5 ASN teachers
 - 1 English for international students





First insights

- Course launch event 6th February: <u>Cabinet Secretary support</u>
- Some challenges emerging from school surveys:
 - "a disconnect between students and their heritage"
 - "a lack of confidence in teaching Scots"
- Other barrier attitudes from surveys:
 - Scots is seen as an add-on to English provision; tokenistic Burns; not a lot of emphasis on using SL in the classroom even though it is used daily by the pupils that I have observed; I was told I should 'speak proper'; Scots 'not professional';

· Aims / benefits

- build students' confidence by reading Scots texts and encouraging them to select texts for their own pleasure
- Keen to offer the Scots Language Award (SLA)
- Working on developing vocabulary, dictionary skills, listening and reading for information
- Form a group to develop a Scots Language Policy and work across the school to deliver learning and teaching in Scots
- Survey has prompted 'chat around the ways we could deliver the SLA and how we could make changes to the ways the pupils engage with Scots
- Boost attainment an achievement as we work to roll out a potential SLA class
- It can help drive equalities in schools
- Lead CPD sessions in school
- Scots language transition primary/secondary received with huge enthusiasm



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
