



Kisses


In France, often people kiss hello to people they know.

Lunches in France are longer than they are in Britain; the pupils at school have an **hour and a half** for lunch.


Lunch in France is usually a baguette filled with ham and cheese.

School

For the pupils, the school day starts very early at **8 o'clock** in the morning!
It usually doesn't finish until **half past 5!**

The pupils get 2 breaks and lunchtime.

The pupils also don't have to wear uniform, but love the idea of it!

The French school system is a little different to the British or English school system:

École Maternelle (Nursery School)

Age 2-6

École primaire/élémentaire

(Primary School)

Age 6-11

Collège (High School)

Age 11-15

- Sixième (1st Year)
- Cinquième (2nd year)
- Quatrième (3rd Year)
- Troisième (4th Year)

Lycée (High School)

Age 15-18

- Seconde (5th Year)
- Première (6th Year)
- Terminale (7th Year)



For example:

Bon après-midi = Have a good afternoon

Bonne journée = Have a good day

Bonne soirée = Have a good evening

Bon voyage = Have a good trip


It is normal to do the same before someone eats:

Bon appetite = Enjoy your meal

Vachement



Some phrases you might not learn in school!

Vachement = really (in fact, this literally translates as 'cowly'!). This is quite informal

Il pleut = It is raining

Il pleut vachement = It is raining really heavily

Elle est jolie = She is pretty

Elle est vachement jolie = She is really pretty



Car Sharing

Car sharing in France is much more common than it is in the UK.

A website called '**Blablacar**' makes it easy to find people who are travelling to the same place as you and allows you to talk and arrange a lift, all at a very cheap price!
