Preliminary survey results

Survey background

- Agreed in 2013-14 by the Association of Directors of Education Scotland (ADES), COSLA, Education Scotland and the Scottish Government
- Gauging progress of the implementation / delivery of the 1+2 approach providing a picture at national level.
- Taken annually until 2019. Then every two years in 2021 and 2023.
- The 2019 survey and 2021 survey full reports are available on the SG website. We are aiming at releasing the full 2023 report in spring 2024.

Preliminary survey results

 Returns were received from 30 of the 32 LAs representing approximately 79% of mainstream primary schools, 86% of mainstream secondary schools and 50% of special schools. Approx. 200 less schools answered than in 2021.

We asked

- How many primary schools provide the "full" L2 provision (an L2 is taught continuously from P1 to P7) or a "partial" provision (an L2 is not taught continuously).
- How many primary schools provide the L3 entitlement (one or more languages are taught as a planned part of the curriculum in P5, P6 and P7 in addition to the L2).
- How many secondary schools provide the "full" L2 provision (an L2 is taught continuously from S1 to S3) or a "partial" provision (an L2 is not taught continuously).
- How many secondary schools provide the L3 entitlement (one or more languages are taught as a planned part of the curriculum at some point in the BGE and in addition to the L2).
